### SPHOA cul de sacs

Cul de sac (or cul-de-sac) is a curious term. The original French means "bottom of the bag." The term was applied in anatomy to "a vessel or tube with only one opening." It came to refer to a dead-end street, especially with a circle at the end for turning around. There's debate over the plural – are they <u>culs</u> de sac or cul de <u>sacs</u>? Or should we just avoid the complications by using the term, "parking area?"

This article isn't really about word history. Instead, let's focus on the history and the future of our cul de sacs in SpringPointe. Of the 106 units in our HOA, 80 are on one of our seven cul de sacs; the other 26 units have individual driveways. The cul de sacs are paved with asphalt and have been seal-coated several times over the years. We can all see that the pavement is no longer in ideal condition.

How long does an asphalt parking lot last? Estimates say 15 to 25 years, based on the initial construction, temperature extremes, precipitation, use, and weight applied. There's no avoiding our intense summer sun and heat. At least we don't have much snow and ice! The recent dry years offered the one consolation of reducing rainwater seepage that could accelerate cracks in pavement. For years, your HOA Board has maintained agreements with Waste Management to keep heavy trash trucks off our cul de sacs.

All of SpringPointe is older than the estimated life of asphalt paving. Our

challenge is to decide what to do, and when. Your Board has consulted contractors and a civil engineer to gather opinions. The consensus is that our asphalt is at the later stages of its life. Seal-coating might provide a cosmetic benefit (an even color and filling tiny cracks), but that expense of over \$25,000 will not actually add to the life of the asphalt. The pavement itself is generally stable - despite cracks, we don't see blocks breaking up to form large potholes as we had on our county streets before the paving this past Spring. We need to prepare for similar removal and repaving of our HOA cul de sacs in the years ahead. Your Board plans to have meetings to discuss paving issues with our owners later this Fall when most snowbirds are back. Stay tuned!

### The Villages terminates long-term agreement

Back in the year 2000, SpringPointe owners on Via Rosaldo were noticing issues with overgrown landscape, erosion and water flow – <u>not</u> in our HOA, but on the neighboring grounds of The Villages of Green Valley. Their common area abuts about 30 SpringPointe units. The SPHOA Board approached The Villages to request remediation, but progress seemed difficult. To protect our owners, our HOA was willing to pay for rock work to limit erosion and channel water from SpringPointers' property, as well as trimming brush that could be a wildfire hazard. Eventually, The Villages signed a license agreement with SPHOA in 2003, allowing us to do certain landscaping in their "recreation area" between the wash and the SPHOA Rosaldo units' home or patio walls.

For 18 years, this agreement enabled SpringPointe to look after our owners' interests by doing limited landscape maintenance in this boundary area. About two years ago, The Villages sent our Board a proposal to revise the agreement. Our Board was not given any input, and in our judgment the proposed changes would be detrimental to SPHOA owners. Despite multiple requests from us to meet and discuss the issues, The Villages did not agree to do so. Instead, they recently notified us they were exercising their right to terminate the license agreement.

SpringPointe owners on Via Rosaldo were notified by mail of The Villages decision. Since our HOA can no longer do any work in that neighboring area, our owners must now individually contact The Villages to handle any landscape issues they may observe (erosion, overgrown brush, etc.).

Your SpringPointe Board was disappointed that The Villages terminated the agreement, especially without ever allowing us to discuss it with them. We encourage SpringPointe owners to be good neighbors and to respect The Villages property and boundary. We also expect The Villages to be respectful in maintaining their common area, especially with regard to fire safety and drainage rights.
