New SPHOA President Looks Ahead

After serving three years as HOA secretary, this year my fellow Directors selected me as President for 2022 - 2023. I appreciate their confidence in me and will do my best to keep SpringPointe performing as a good association...and a great neighborhood to live in.

I believe that the past two years of living with Covid – 19 have reduced social contact and cohesion. Let's hope the situation continues to improve and we can all get back to being out – and – about more freely, hosting social gatherings, etc. That would go a long way to restore the neighborly feeling of our HOA.

Home sales in SpringPointe have been very positive. Ten units changed hands this past year, most with prices above \$200,000. That's testament to the desirability of our HOA. We all contribute to that by maintaining and improving our homes. On that note, this is a great time to think ahead to any improvements you might be considering. Please remember that any exterior modifications, even maintenance like painting, usually require an approval with a submitted Architectural Request Form. You'll find the rules and form in our HOA Directory or our website SpringPointeHoa.com under "Legal Documents and Forms."

With last summer's strong storms in mind, this is also a time to be sure the roof and parapets are in good shape. One potential problem is the scuppers where water drains from the flat roof. Check for any debris blocking them, like leaves. Also make sure they're well sealed with no cracks in the caulk where the scuppers go through the brick wall—that's a potential leak into your walls during a storm.

Our HOA faces a significant budget challenge: Building more reserves to eventually repave our *cul de sacs*. Eighty of our 106 homes are built on the seven *cul de sacs*, so the great majority of owners are directly affected by the condition of our pavement. We're approaching the useful life of the asphalt. Last fall, the Board reviewed a multi— year plan to devote more of each year's budget to reserves. We all need to stay committed. Unexpected events like last summer's destructive storms can affect these plans. As a community, we'll need to be open and honest about HOA finances and priorities.

Wondering what you can do? I encourage every homeowner to stay informed—read our minutes, emails, and newsletters. Please consider where and how you might volunteer your time and talents. Our HOA would benefit from re starting some social events—we need someone to chair **Social Activities**, like arranging a potluck or cookout at the clubhouse, or a group meal at a local restaurant. A volunteer Clubhouse Manager would help assure that the facility is tidy and well -organized for homeowners to use for their own gatherings. Late this year we'll need someone to chair the Nominations and Election Committee, encouraging people to run for the Board seats. All of these are opportunities for homeowners to make our HOA stronger and more successful. There's plenty of room to get involved!



Our Town's Heroes

The Green Valley firemen are our town's heroes. These men and women perform emergency and non-emergency services ranging from one extreme to another, making the versatility of their job incomprehensible. Our Firemen could easily be on Marvels list of Super Heroes.

The firemen from four stations in Green Valley are on the scene for:

Fires Patient Assists

Motor Vehicle Accidents Desert Animal Relocation

Emergency medical calls Hiker and Swift Water Rescue

Their job description continues with education programs and services.

Public Education CERT - Community Emergency Response Team

CPR and First Aid Training SHIM - Safety & Health in Motion

Fire Corp Fire Prevention

The Fire Corp consisting of men and women volunteers give non-emergency support in prevention and safety services. Two of their special programs are the Smoke Alarm and Lock Box. The Fire Corp will change the smoke alarm batteries for a max of 8 alarms for \$20. The alarms are also tested to make sure they are working properly. You can buy a new \$20 alarm which is installed by the volunteers. Spring-Pointe has high ceilings with alarms near the ceiling. Using ladders is dangerous and this program is a real benefit for seniors. However, this program has been placed on hold due to Covid 19 until it is safe for volunteers.

Lock boxes cost \$50 and \$25 for installation. Home keys are placed in this outside strong box and can only be opened with a special key by GVFD firefighters or Fire Corp Volunteers.

You can also call 911 and quickly announce non-emergency. They will ask "What is your problem?" You will be connected to the agency needed. I have used this method for snake removal and patient assist. For more information about the Fire Department programs search with https://gvfire.org


