His childhood was filled with Southwest influences and experiences in Sasabe, Arivaca, and Amado. After graduation from Nogales High School, he joined the Army, serving his country for 23 years.

Elephant Head was home after he retired at Fort Huachuca from the Army. He was a patriot who loved the American flag. Often, he proudly displayed Old Glory.

His service, with mariachi music, on January 7, 2022 was attended by many friends and family who celebrated his life. A military graveside service was held with full honors.

Preceding him in death was his first wife Beverly Salazar. He is survived by his wife Sandra Salazar of SpringPointe.

Guy Stewart

Guy was born January 1st, 1932 in Boone County, Nebraska. His parents Gilbert and Stella Stewart raised 8 children on their Nebraska farm. It is here Guy, the seventh child, learned the work ethic and necessity of teamwork and cooperation.

Music was in his soul. He played the piano and filled his life with music. He later collected old books dating from the 1800's.

At the age of 21, he became an American nomad moving to Texas, California, Missouri, Oregon, and Washington. He worked 18 years in the music records and tapes industry and another 19 years as a buyer for the City of Seattle.

Guy sponsored foreign exchange students from Brazil and China. He remained close to his exchange students, referring to them as his sons and they called him Dad.

Retiring in 1996, he moved to New Mexico. Later moving to Green Valley in 2001. He was a director on the SpringPointe Board.
