A Special Christmas Tree

The Vikings in the Land of Ice and Fire had not used good conservation methods. High winds and low temperatures made it difficult for seedlings to grow without the protection of mother trees. Nary a tree dotted the tundra.

As Christmas approached, a fog of homesickness penetrated the Bachelor Officers Quarters (military housing for single officers and civilian teachers). The Christmas trees had not arrived on the last supply ship and we knew there was the possibility of not having a decorated tree for the holiday.

Many of the teachers were going skiing in Germany for the holiday. What better place to find decorated Christmas trees than Germany? After all, Martin Luther had decorated the first tree in 1605 and the custom had spread from Germany to the rest of the Christian world. But what about those who would not be able to leave the island for Christmas?

Something had to be done about this depressing situation. Climbing into a cold station wagon, I drove over the icy road to a black sand beach by the Atlantic. Arriving at my favorite spot, a cup of hot tea was poured from the thermos as thoughts reoccurred about the situation that would put a damper on many a Christmas spirit.

Feeling cozy and gazing over the seascape, an object was seen. WHAT is that on the black sand? It looked like a tree trunk! Racing toward the beach it became clear that the trunk was a banister from an old ship. Excitement filled my heart. The tea had thawed the creative process. A design for a tree was developed. The tree would have driftwood branches and a banister trunk.

Working in the woodshop each day after school, the tree took shape. The five foot tree had five layers with six driftwood branches on each layer. The word was out! "What are you doing at the woodshop?" "A surprise," I would answer.

Next, an open invitation was sent to bring a handmade decoration for a Christmas tree and to share some holiday cheer. "Where did Kae get a tree?" asked the sailors. "We think it has something to do with the woodshop," answered the teachers.

The day arrived when each person placed their decoration on the tree. Decorations were made from wine corks, nuts, fruit, straws, volcanic rock, construction paper, Icelandic coins, popcorn, pieces of material, candles, and knotted rope. Our eyes filled with tears when the candles were lit.

Looking at each other we saw a reflection of the knowledge that this was a special tree, for it was a part of all of us. It had united a group of homesick Americans. We raised our glasses and toasted a very special Christmas tree.
